The Department of Anthropology and the Centre for Diaspora and Transnational Studies in the Faculty of Arts and Science at the University of Toronto invite applications for a tenure-stream position at the rank of Assistant Professor in the area of African Diaspora studies. This will be a joint appointment between the Department of Anthropology (51%) and the Centre for Diaspora and Transnational Studies (49%). The position will commence July 1, 2019, or shortly thereafter.

Applicants must have earned a Ph.D. in Anthropology or a closely related discipline by July 1, 2019, or shortly thereafter, and have a demonstrated record of excellence in research and teaching. We seek candidates whose research and teaching interests complement and strengthen existing faculty strengths. The successful candidate will be expected to pursue innovative and independent research at the highest international level and to establish an outstanding, competitive, and externally funded research program.

Candidates must submit a statement outlining their current and future research, and provide evidence of research excellence as demonstrated by a record of publications in top-ranked, field relevant and peer-reviewed journals, or forthcoming publications meeting high international standards, presentations at significant conferences, awards and accolades and strong endorsements from referees of high standing. Candidates must also provide evidence of an active research program in African Diaspora that contributes to one or more of these areas: public health, gender, medicine, performance, education, law, human rights, kinship, and religion as well as an emerging reputation in research as demonstrated by the ability to attract external research funding.

Evidence of excellence in teaching, will be provided by the teaching dossier that outlines past experience and teaching accomplishments, a teaching statement that outlines teaching philosophy and plans for future teaching, sample course syllabi, student evaluations and strong letters of reference. The teaching dossier must also provide demonstrated evidence of expertise in African Diaspora in the context of one or more of the following: public health, gender, medicine, performance, education, law, human rights, kinship, and religion. Experience teaching across interdisciplinary boundaries would be a definite asset.

Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience.

The University of Toronto is a large, tri-campus institution in a vibrant, multi-ethnic region and has a very diverse student population. The Department of Anthropology is a multi-field unit with diverse research and teaching. It has 27 full-time faculty at the St. George campus and 53 graduate faculty across its three campuses. The Centre for Diaspora and Transnational Studies is an incubator for research across the humanities and social sciences with a vibrant undergraduate program and a growing collaborative graduate program.
